The bird was essentially identical to the picture of the female Hermit Warbler in <u>Birds of North America</u>. The back was very gray. It was seen very well at close range and all three observers saw agreed that there was no green or even any green hints. A gray spike ran up the back of the head, but did not reach the top of the head. The forehead was as yellow as the rest of the face. The yellow on the face was fairly bright, but not as bright as the female Townsend's that was in the same tree.
