is not enough. Describe what you actually saw in the field:

Mark Holmgren, the English veterinary doctor & myself left the group of DFO members who, since it was a very hot day, opted for the shade. We set off through the mudflats to get better views of the sandpipers further out.

Being new to this area, I like to look closely at Franklin's gulls and turned the scope to the sandbar upon which they sat. One bird was very noticeably smaller than the others by about $\frac{1}{4}$. I remarked about it but other than size didn't look at it closer but turned the scope over to the others. Either Mark or the Englishman said that the bird was a least tern. Mark had not seen a Least Tern

line through eye meeting the ~~rim~~ up yellow wing.

Describe the habitat in which you observed this bird:

Pewitt reservoir, sandbar (island)

How were similarly appearing species eliminated?

As far as I know, at least in summer plumage there is no other tern or gull with the same appearance as a Least Tern. If I hadn't been so lazy due to heat & a long birding day, I'd have identified the bird myself. We were close enough to have a long, good look.

None of the other terns, except for the Black, is smaller than a Franklin's gull and because the bird was with Franklin's gull, there was no mistaking its size.

Prior experience with this and similarly appearing species:

4-5 years experience in California at Bay Bridge Toll Plaza (salt marsh)

Books, illustrations and advice consulted and how did these influence this documentation?

Robbins & Peterson field guides confirmed that what we saw was a Least Tern. Hoft & Lane's book was also consulted later on to find out about its occurrence in Colorado after Sophie.
