habits: The bird would appear for only about 3-5 minutes at a time. Most of the time spent in the area was split feeding on the						
abundant hummingbird-friendly flowers and perching on dead sunflower heads. The bird only sparingly visited a hummingbird feeder.						
DESCRIPTION – Blocky, medium-sized hummingbird. Bill proportionately fairly short, straight, and dark. (Yellow on bill in 2 <sup>nd</sup>						
photo is pollen.) Head appears proportionately large. Crown and nape greenish. Small white patch behind eye, thin pale gray line						
above eye. Lores dark. Auriculars gray, with paler gray border behind the darker gray "ear" patch. "Cheeks" paler gray. Diffuse red						
throat patch visible at some angles (partially visible but not flashing red in 1 <sup>st</sup> photo.) Back greenish, same color as cap and nape.						
Wings dark, terminating just slightly above tail tip. Folded tail mostly dark, with thin white terminal tail band visible. Flanks (not pictured) were grayish-green, transitioning to a paler gray belly. Breast was a bit lighter gray then belly.						
Describe the bird's (birds') call(s) and/or song(s), if noted: n/a						
SIMILAR SPECIES – Allen's/Rufous Juvenile males & adult females show red throat spots, but have rufous flanks and tail bases,						
neither of which were visible. Juvenile male Broad-tailed Hummingbirds may show limited red throat spots, but have longer tail						
projection than this bird, and buffy flanks. Juvenile male Calliope Hummingbirds may have limited red throat spots, but are much						
smaller and have wingtips that look even or a bit longer than the tail tip. Juvenile male Ruby-throated Hummingbirds may have						
limited red throat spots but should have tails projecting much longer than the wingtips as seen in this bird. Juvenile male Lucifer Hummingbirds may have limited red throat spots, but are much smaller and have distinctly curving bills. Sub-adult Plain-capped						
Starthroats can have limited red throat spots, but look much bigger and have proportionately much longer bills. Other N.A.						
hummingbirds that I'm familiar with don't show red throat spots. Additionally, none of the birds mentioned above have the big-						
headed look of Anna's Hummingbird.
