The all dark bill was slightly decurved and pointed. The face was grayish brown above the eye and off white below the eye. A bright red orbital ring surrounded the black eye, slightly thicker above and behind the eye. In flight, the bird was long tailed and pointy winged. From below the tail appeared darker than the rest of the bird, which was off white in appearance and the wings lacked any rufous in the primaries. The underside of the tail was never seen well, the bird was always perched facing away from me. Leg color was also not seen. Describe the bird's (birds') call(s) and/or song(s), if noted: None heard. SIMILAR SPECIES – This is another critical part of your report. Please discuss how you eliminated similar species from				
consideration: Red orbital eye ring and lack of rufous in the primaries eliminates Yellow-billed Cuckoo. All black bill, red orbital eye ring and lack of a face mask eliminate the highly unlikely Mangrove Cuckoo.
