

SPECIES: Yellow-billed Loon Gavia adamsii 1-963  
(Vernacular Name) (Scientific Name)  
DATE(S): 1/3/91 TIME OF OBSERVATION: 13:50 pm TO 14:40 pm  
EXACT LOCATION: Just offshore from the observation point on the south side of the Rawh.  
NEAREST TOWN: north of Ft. Collins, Wellington COUNTY: Larimer River Plant pond  
OTHER OBSERVERS WHO INDEPENDENTLY IDENTIFIED THIS BIRD: Hamilton Reservoir  
Kevin Rogers (brother)

OPTICAL EQUIPMENT: 10x 50 binoculars, spotting scope with zoom. (→60x) eyepiece  
WEATHER CONDITIONS: mostly clear  
BIRD/SUN ORIENTATION: sun mostly behind me  
DISTANCE FROM BIRD AND HOW MEASURED: 50 yards (estimated)  
NUMBER OF BIRDS SEEN: 1 SEX: immature  
BEHAVIOR AND Demeanor: Swimming just offshore, primarily resting and preening

HEAD & NECK (forehead, crown, auricular & malar regions, median line, etc.)  
Thick-necked, large loon with heavy bill, brown forehead, crown, nape and back of neck. Brown not as dark as in Common Loon and not extending as far forward on sides of neck. Dark "ear spot" below and behind eye.  
EYES & LORES (supercilium, eye-ring, eye-stripe, color, etc.): \_\_\_\_\_

LOWER & UPPER MANDIBLES (color & shape): Bill dull yellow with yellow straight culmen that was yellow on outer 2/3. Strong gonysial angle. ✓  
LEGS & FEET: Bill held slightly upturned

UPPERPARTS (nape, back, rump, uppertail coverts, etc.):  
Back brown, evenly scalloped with pale fringes over entirety

UNDERPARTS (chin, throat, belly, sides, flanks, crissum, etc.):  
Chin, throat, and foreneck white. Dark to water line

RETRICES (inner, middle & outer tail feathers; color, pattern, shape, etc.):

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HABITAT: *large reservoir, open water*

ELIMINATION OF SIMILARLY APPEARING SPECIES:

A single small immature Common Loon was present for comparison (at first this bird, which was initially distant, was thought to be a Pacific Loon due to its small bill lacking a strong genual angle and no obvious white "indentations" on the neck - when the bird swam closer, however, a single white "indentation" was visible, the nape was seen to be as dark as the back, and the bill was within the range of variation shown by Common Loons). Compared to the Common Loon, the Yellow-billed Loon was much larger (direct comparison was possible), a paler brown with less extensive brown on neck, and had a very different bill from the Common's blue-gray bill (held horizontally) with all dark culmen.

PRIOR EXPERIENCE WITH THIS AND SIMILARLY APPEARING SPECIES:

Seen once previously on 1/30/82 at the Berkeley Marina in central California. Numerous Common, Pacific, and Red-throated Loons seen throughout the winter every year in California.
