Describe the bird's behavior (e.g. flying, feeding, or habits used in identifying): Walking about on muddy shore and in shallow water of pool formed as reservoir receded; among other species of shore birds. Probing mud with bill using a slow, deliberate movement and stabbing at many floating insects on the water's surface. Leisurely, calmly feeding.

Describe in detail the bird's relative size, overall shape, plumage and color pattern. Include details of bill, wing and tail shape. Give particular emphasis to marks you used to identify the bird. Reference to its resemblance to field guide descriptions and illustrations is not enough. Describe only what you actually observed in the field: Stocky build; pale gray back and wings with black primaries. Crown same gray with grayish tinge to cheeks and upper breast, white underparts. Legs yellow-green (shorter than Dowitcher or Stilt Sandpiper). Prominent white eye brow. Bill dark medium length, and sturdy - noticeably shorter than Dowitcher or Stilt Sandpiper, and straight.

Description (continued):

Overall size about same as Killdeer nearby. Larger than Sandpipers, Baird's Sandpiper and Pectoral Sandpiper in intermediate area. Slightly smaller than Black-bellied Plovers and Long-billed Dowitchers nearby. Whole community feeding quietly and peacefully. Tail white, finely banded with gray.

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery, (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration): None

Describe the general and specific habitat in which you observed the bird: Shallow pools and surrounding mud flats. Cattle grazing in adjacent pastures. Reeds, broken or nibbled off by cattle, growing along edges, extending into water in some areas.

How did you eliminate similarly appearing species?

Dowitchers: longer bill, feeding style fast "sewing machine"; has heavier barring on tail, white wedge up back; sides and flanks with some barring. Longer legs.

Stilt Sandpiper: longer, thinner bill, slightly down curved; feeding style similar to Dowitcher; longer legs.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species?

Have seen Red Knot 4x in 1992 & '93 in Colo. and ix in Texas

Have seen all other species mentioned several times in Colo. & Tx.
