The tanager was first seen perched on a dead branch of a pinyon, later to various trees. It was seen feeding on apples, plums, and insects. Robins chickadees, red-naped sapsuckers, Lewis' woodpeckers, western tanagers, goldfinches, and various warblers and vireos were seen about, however each went on with their own business. It was noticeably uneasy whenever a starline perched or flew nearby. Otherwise it displayed a relatively calm attitude allowing us to observe. The first few days it could be found in early aftern resting deep in a chokecherry clump about 3 feet from the ground. The days it was seen in September it was very calm and we observed it at length. When it returned in October it was very "jumpy", frequently interrupting his feast of fruit to look up and around, and flying away at the slightest movement.

a all flets marks observed: size, color, pattern, shape, bill, etc. Describe any unique features this bird had.

Size of Bullock's oriole and western tanager.

Very bright red with dull grayed-red wings, back, and tail, and ear patches Darkish beak.

This bird looked "out of place" because of the very bright color and so different from birds seen in our area.

What song or sounds did it make?

We never heard or noticed a song or sound which we could associate with the bird until 9/18 when we saw and heard it one time. It was not heard after that.

Field marks not seen. Why not? The lighting on this bird made a big difference in field marks noted or not noticed, particularly the ear patch which did not appear as vividly as at other times.	ariation from expected field marks .
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List similar species. Why and how did you eliminate them? First impression: a cardinal but no crest Next idea: scarlet tanager but not the black markings To the books: summer tanger but not as bright, lacked yellow bill.

What is your experience with this or similar birds?
