light condition - partly cloudy at 11:30 when I saw the bird, but I was so close to the bird that I could see it well without my binoculars -

I was about 15 feet from the bird - The painting bunting was feeding on a hanging feeder with about five Lazuli Buntings -

Mary Grieß's son, Ray, and I were the only people observing the bird at this

time.

Habitat - Mary's residence has a lot of shrubs and trees as do many of the residences near by. Near foothills

The Painted Bunting stayed for two days at Mary Grieß's residence - May 9-10-1986

Wanda Grieß, Mary's daughter, saw the bird no'clock<sup>a.m.</sup> on May 9. Wanda<sup>was</sup> getting ready to go to work. She saw this different bird with all the lazuli bunting that were feeding on the driveway (the driveway is dirt and Mary throws feed on it). Wanda awakened her mother to come see the bird. Mary knew immediately it was a painted bunting. She had one last year but it stayed only a few hours.

Many of these observers saw the Painted Bunting eating on the driveway with 40 to 50 Lazuli bunting — a sight to behold — though someone had thrown handfuls of as glittering stones (jewels) onto the dirt driveway — The Painted Bunting was also seen at a feeder near Mary Griest's home (just across the road) & in a <sup>residence</sup> <sup>eat in tree then</sup> I heard, no call or sound from the painted bunting.

The Painting Bunting was easy to distinguish from the Lazuli bunting in whose company it was seen.

The first thing I noticed was the chartreuse part of the upper back with the red lower on the back as it sat on the feeder <sup>eating with back toward</sup> beside the Lazuli buntings — Then I saw the blue head and complete red belly (underparts) and dark wings and the black at the end of the tail when it turned around — Then I also saw the red eye ring.

I had never seen a painted bunting before.

This report was written after observation.
