How did you eliminate similarly appearing species? No other small finch/sparrow type bird has all red underparts. Vermillor flycatcher has, but dacks a green back, blue head tred rump-

IN the proper habitat, we see + kear them even more as it tends to be shyer than Indigo I Found bird due to knowing the song before I ever sow it ?
