Description of the bird's behavior: Bird was weary and somewhat difficult to approach. This bird remained in cover of oak canopy and after becoming aware of my presence, nerviously flew without hesitation out of view.

Description of the bird observed: Bird was first observed flying away from me and the first thing I noticed was a small bird the size of an Indigo Bunting with a distinctive red rump. At this point I yelled to Lisa that I think a Painted Bunting just flew up out of view. I followed and watched for movement in the oak canopy and a male Painted Bunting appeared. With binoculars, I was able to observe clearly the blue head, green back and red underparts and eye-ring before the bird flew.

Description of the bird's song and/or call if heard: The bird did not vocalize. **Description of the habitat where the bird was observed:** The Painted Bunting initially flew from low shrubs along the riparian corridor 10 feet from the creek. The bird was then found in a stand of mature gambel oak trees on top of an embankment 25 feet from the creek. General habitat charactoristics include: canyons containing willow and other riparian shrubs adjacent stream, a cottonwood gallery, and juniper beyond the riparian area interspersed with gambel oak and cholla cactus.

WEATHER - Claud cover 15%, mid-seventies, slight breeze, sunny.

Elimination of similar species: Blue Grosbeaks are larger with no red or green in their plumage. Indigo and Lazuli Buntings are similar in size but neither have red or green in their plumage. The striking male plumage of the Painted Bunting eliminates all other similar species including sparrows which may be similar in size.

Prior experience with this and similar appearing species: Painted Bunting - Rio Grande Valley, Texas (Spring 98), Sinaloa, Mexico (Winter 98). Indigo Buntings, Lazuli Buntings, Blue Grosbeaks - individuals seen daily in Cottonwood canyon (22-24 May 98).
