The birds were actively foraging in the canopy. They moved constantly within the canopy gleaning in the fashion of several vireo and warbler species. Not particularly useful for identification except very generally.

Thick, straight, vireo bill. Gray head. Olive green back. Dark gray wings with 2 white wingbars. Dingly white throat, breast, and belly. Yellowish sides and flanks. White eye ring and spectacle line. Dark gray tail, lighter gray beneath.

Describe birds call or song: None.

Discuss similar species and how you eliminated them:

These birds were much yellower on the sides and flanks than any Plumbeous Vireo that I have ever seen. Their heads were rather dull gray rather than the brighter blue-gray of the Blue-headed Vireo.

What is your prior experience with this and similar-appearing species? Minimal experience with Cassin's. I have seen one previously in western Colorado. I have seen Blue-headed in Minnesota. I have seen hundreds of Plumbeous Vireos..
