The bird was obviously a Solitary - type, with striking gray and white face pattern, strong wingbars, mostly white below with yellowish Flands. The stilling sharp contrast between the dark blue-gray area of face and crown with the white spectrale immediately suggested Blue-headed - the cran was a solid blue-gray with no kint of greenish or olive, and it contrasted fairly sharply with the greenish back. Also, the line of demaication between the dark maler and white throat was very crisp. The absence of any faint buff wash across breast indicated male. Then the bird says a series of rich warbling notes, evenly spaced, recalling Red-eyed Vireo Cand eliminiting slower, more mountal, shorter songs of Clumbrous or Cassin's), Several brief singing boats. Also the nasal, harsh "bouncing ball " chatter heard twice - characteristic of Blue-headed (also in Cassin's - Elumberry?). I watched the bird from as close as 20 feet in good Fight.

Few Colorado records, but underbledly overlooked
