I identified the bird by it's vireo shape, thick bill, dark eyeline, and white eyeline. Also by it's yellow and white front. The bill was dark , small, and thick. The eye was seen at close view it had dark with light around the pupils. The head was gray, with a white eyeline over the dark eye stripe which went through the eye, also a light cheek patches. The nape was gray, darker then forehead. The back was dark olive green. The wings were also in green tones. The tail also was greenish dark. The throat was light. The breast and flanks were yellow, the belly was white however not all yell or not all white. The legs seemed black. The bird was about 5 1/4 inches in length. The wings were typical vireo shaped. The tail was typical vireo shaped.
