Describe the birds behavior (e.g. flying, feeding, or habits used in identifying): First heard as it fed about 20 feet off the ground. It was searching leaves for food, resting only for several seconds at a time, singing again, and moving very actively. After about a minute, if flew to another tree in the area, repeated this behavior a few times, then flew to another tree where it continued to move quickly (frenetically), while calling and feeding.

Describe in detail the bird's relative size, overall shape, plumage and color pattern. Include details of bill, wing and tail shape. Give particular emphasis to marks you used to identify the bird. Reference to its resemblance to field guide descriptions and illustrations is not enough. Describe only what you actually observed in the field:

Vireo shape and sized. Large, distinct vireo bill seen well and eliminates warbler. Overall color was

gray-olive above and a light wash of lemony-yellow below. Yellow began at the throat, covering breast and most of belly; Sides seemed slightly lighter shade of yellow. There were obvious head markings, but entire head and facial pattern were seen well but only briefly; Darkish head with a dark line that contrasted with a white eyebrow and created a sharp demarcations (It was not dull like a Warbling Vireo); No wing bars. No spectacles. No streaking below.

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery, (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration): Best described as a slower version of a Red-eyed Vireo. Both observers made that comment in the field. It was calling when first discovered, in a short phrases (vireo fashion), repeated over and over again. Called as it was feeding and immediately upon landing in a new tree.

Describe the general and specific habitat in which you observed the bird:

Forest edge, in deciduous trees that had leaves, adjacent to a river and an open field. There were some shrubs in the area but it was never seen less than 20 feet above the ground.

How did you eliminate similarly appearing species?

Song heard was identical to the Philadelphia Vireo recording on Eastern Peterson tapes.

Red-eyed Vireo- call similar but noticeably slower; lemony wash to throat, belly, sides and breast rather than white was obvious. Red-eyed Vireo was also present in the area allowing comparision w/i 10 min. of sighting. Facial pattern not quite right for REV.

Warbling Vireo - call distinctively different and had no "warble" to it. This species is sometimes lemony-yellow in fall but not in the belly area--more restricted to sides. Despite short look at face, the facial pattern was more distinct than WV, with dark line in addition to bright white eyebrow. This bird did not have the "wide-eyed" appearance of a WV. There were many WV's in area to compare with. Yellow-throated Vireo--call very different, yellow was not as bright and did not end abruptly on belly; no wingbars and it did not have yellow spectacles.

Solitary (Eastern form) and White-eyed Vireo--call very different, yellow was more uniform underneatch; it did not have wingbars or spectacles.

All Warblers eliminated by pattern, voice, shape and bill.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species? I have seen this species 5 times and similarly appearing species many, many times.
