Tail gray brown. DESCRIBE SONG/CALLS IF ANY: None

DISCUSS SIMILAR SPECIES AND HOW YOU ELIMINATED THEM: Thick-billed Vireo will have vellow underparts entirely. Not Pine Warbler ... bill much too thick and vireo-like. Lacks white eye of White-eyed Vireo. Yellow throat and breast breaking to white eliminates all other vireos.

WHAT IS YOUR PRIOR EXPERIENCE WITH THIS AND SIMILARLY APPEARING SPECIES? Lisa and I have seen this species in Yucatan, Mexico; Manitoba, Canada; and in San Luis Valley.
