Duration of observation: about 1 minute

Description: While conducting a Big Day, I found a juvenile Little Blue Heron, which my teammates Chris Wood and Brandon Percival also got to see. It was a white heron with a Snowy Egret nearby. It was slightly bigger than the egret with a stouter, bicolored (grayish and dark) bill. It was standing in fairly deep water, thus only a small portion of its legs were visible. The portion of the legs that was visible was greenish. The bare loral skin was bluish-gray and the eyes were yellowish. I did not discern whether the bird had dark primary tips. The bird foraged very sedately, not like the often frenetic foraging style of Snowy Egret.

I did not see the bird after this date, despite its continued presence reported by other observers. There were numerous juvenile Snowy Egrets (2-12) present at this site in the first half of August, however.

Similar species eliminated: The only real confusion species is Snowy Egret which can be exceedingly similar. This bird had the typical bill shape and pattern of a juvenile Little Blue Heron. Juvenile Snowy Egrets have more completely dark bills and usually show at least a trace of the adult yellow lores. Leg color can be identical in recently-fledged individuals of the two species.

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration): No vocalizations heard.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly-appearing species? I have seen 1000s of Little Blues and Snowy Egrets across the country.

Light conditions: sun overhead

Optical equipment used: Kowa 30x

Distance, and how estimated: estimated at about 200 meters
