Nice dark gray cheek patch. Gray throat. White breast and belly. Between the belly and undertail coverts (that were white) was a strip of buff. Flanks were gray buff. Two bright yellow wingbars. Nape and upper back area was gray and tertials were gray edged in light gold yellow. Tail was gray also. Primaries were dark gray.
