Similar species Immature male Bullock's Orioles have Blackehins a dark eye line, and whitish belly. The bird I saw lacked all These field Marks. Female Bullock's Oriole also have eye line, whitish belly, and grayer backs. Bullock's Oriole have lighter wings obscuring wing bars and making Them less distinct. The bird I saw had dark brownish gray wings with 2 distinct wing bars, Since This immature Baltimore Oriole showed no major Characteristic of Bullock's, I do not believe it was

a hybrid.
