(Describe in great detail all parts of the plumage including beak and feet coloration in addition to the diagnostic characteristics; however, include only what actually was seen in the field): medium sized plover - fall plumage - brownish tint to speckled back / appeared smaller and browner than Black Bellied Plovers & Redshank - no wing stripe - dark rump and tail notes Black Bellied Plover It was feeding in a wet grassy area with 10 or more Killdeer which made it obvious - It wasn't nervous and it stayed feeding and walking while I observed it well

7. Description of voice, if heard: none heard

8. Description of behavior: similar to the Killdeers with which it was feeding - I suppose typical Plover behavior - running + walking

9. Habitat - general: short grass prairie

specific: near shallow fresh water lake shore line
