Description:

This bird was similar to Mourning Dove in Size and shape with a slightly shorter stubbler Tail. The bird appeared slightly chunkier and more pot-bellied Than Mourning Dove.

It's most prominent feature was a large oblong white wing patch noticeable in flight and spanning lower part of wing from shoulder to dark primaries on folded wing. Dark primaries Contrasted boldly with white patch. Wings lacked spots present in Mourning Dove.

This bird was uniformly sindy light gray brown above and below. Bright sky-blue spectacles completely surrounded eye and extended into lores to me slim dark bill. Eye was dark with bright red iris. A bold dork crescent shape black line bordered lower guriculars. There was a faint short post ocular line.

Tail was grayish with large white Tips. Legs were short and pink.

The bird often called: "Who-cooks-for-you" sometimes followed by a "coooah-cooouh, coooah-cooouh"
