Describe the general and specific habitat in which the bird(s) occurred: riparian habitat willows along Marvine creek bank,

Describe the bird's behavior (flying, feeding, habits, behaviors used in identifying the species or in supporting the identification): / The bird landed on top of willow along the creek bank, then appeared to be flycatching from the top of the willow until chased off by a Yellow Warbler.

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Describe the bird in detail. : The bird appeared close in size to a nearby Yellow Warbler. Bird had gray upperparts, bright yellow underparts. Obvious light colored eye ring. Bold black "necklace" of black streaks on the vellow breast.

Describe birds call or song: Song made me think of Common Yellowthroat, but started with a short note, then a richer warble with additional syllable between the two "wichery" sounds. I heard the song before sighting the bird and heard it again the next morning, but did not see the bird again.

Discuss similar species and how you eliminated them: I am not familiar with any species that look much like a Canada Warbler.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species? This is the first Canada Warbler that I've seen. We often see McGillivray's, Yellow-rumped, Wilson's, Orange-crowned and Yellow Warblers here.

List books, guides, recordings or other sources consulted and how this influenced your identification

(during and after observation): I compared my notes to a third edition National Geographic Birds of North America field guide. I also looked at warblers on Thayer Birding Software's Birds of North America, compared the song to Peterson's Western Birds and Thayers CDs. I compared the sonogram of the Canada Warbler to the birdsong I was hearing and it was a match. I listened to other warbler songs to be see if there were any others similiar, didn't find any I thought I could have gotten confused with Canada Warbler.
