Describe only what you actually observed in the field: Much smaller than mourning d. but of the same shape (even smaller body size than robin). Feather pattern on breast + somewhat on back much like scaled quail; appearance (scaly-looking). White outer edges on tail. Rusty, cinnamon colored patches in wings, visible when bird was in flight.

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery, (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration):

No song or call.

Describe the general and specific habitat in which you observed the bird:

Urban setting (using the term loosely; after all, it is Lamar!). Backyard habitat; Chinese elm trees, shrubs, lawn, bird feed

How did you eliminate similarly appearing species?

Much smaller than mourning doves; more scaled appearance than common ground dove or white-tipped dove; white edged tail clear to base of tail, unlike white-tipped dove.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species?

I've never seen an Inca dove before, but I've seen many mourning doves, some white-winged doves, a few spotted dove
