1994 TRANSCRIPTION OF GYRFALCON NOTES.

INITIALLY DROVE BY THIS BIRD PERCHED ON A PHONE POLE JUST OFF THE ROAD. IMMEDIATELY FELT IT WAS A GYRFALCON AS IT'S SILHOUETTE WAS OBVIOUSLY FALCONINE BUT IT WAS BY FAR THE LARGEST FALCON I'VE EVER SEEN. I DROVE PAST, STOPPED, I TURNED, I SLOWLY DROVE BACK TOWARDS THE BIRD. IT, OF COURSE, FLEW OFF AND I HAD TO BE AT WORK. DISCOURTED TO LAMBERT AND ARRANGED FOR TIME OFF AND WAS BACK IN 45 MINUTES. THE BIRD WAS PERCHED ON A LARGE CEMENT POWER POLE ABOUT 300 YARDS NORTH. IT FLEW IN TO IT'S ORIGINAL PERCH WHILE I WAS WATCHING. THE BIRD WAS QUITE CLOSE AS I COULDN'T EVEN FOCUS MY SCOPE ON IT.

IT'S PLUMAGE WAS SLATE GRAY ABOVE - DARKER THAN A CALIFORNIA GULL. THE UNDERSIDES WERE WHITE WITH BOLD DARK STREAKS FROM THE UPPER BREAST TO UNDERTAIL FLANKS, LOWER BELLY AND UNDERTAIL COVERTS SPOTTED. TAIL WAS LONG - EXTENDING WELL PAST THE WINGTIPS AND REMINISCENT OF A HAWK OWL. BRIGHT YELLOW CERES. THIN MUSTACHIAL STRIPE LIKE A PRAIRIE FALCON. CROWN, NAPE AND FACE PALE AND FINELY STREAKED WITH GRAY. LEGS HEAVILY FEATHERED DOWN TO FEET. TOES YELLOW. NO JESSES OR BANDS. EYES DARK. TAIL PALE GRAY-WHITE EVENLY BANDED WITH DARK GRAY. CHIN WHITE. THIN PALE GRAY FRINGE TO COVERTS; SECONDARIES. PRIMARIES SAME SHADE OF GRAY AS BACK. PALE BAND ON FOREHEAD AT BASE OF CERE. IN FLIGHT THE UNDERSIDE OF WINGS WERE A UNIFORM NOTCHED GRAY ON WHITE. IT DID A FAIR AMOUNT OF SOARING BETWEEN STRONG FLAPPING TO ALTHOUGH

THE ATTACHED PRINTS WERE MADE FROM THE
ENCLOSED SLIDES. THE UNDERWING PATTERN IS
DISCERNIBLE IF HELD UNTERE BRIGHT LIGHT.

MONDAY 3/14/68 - ^{68. noted?} A large falcon flushed an owl from HAMMIS FORD
AND A LARGE FALCON DROVE ON IT AND CHASED IT OFF.
I ONLY SAW IT FOR A FEW SECONDS BUT NOTED THE
GRAY TOPSIDE AND LACK OF DARK AXILLARIES BELOW.
COULDN'T BE SURE IT WASN'T A PEREGRINE. THIS
BIRD GAVE A RAPTOR-LIKE "SCREE" CALL.
SIZE AND TAIL LENGTH AND LACK OF "HELMET"
ELIMINATED PEREGRINE. SIZE AND COLORING ELIMINATED
RAUTULE FALCON. SIZE, LACK OF EYEBROW, TAIL PATTERN
AND MUSTACHE STRIPE ELIMINATED GOSHAWK.
