DOCUMENTATION OF LATILONG PARE BIRD SIGHTING

If you watch birds solely for your own enjoyment, a written description of your observations is unnecessary. Compilers of regional bird lists must insist that their records be scientifically sound; future bird students—those studying occurrences 50 years from now—must have a written record on which to depend. By providing the verifying written description, you are employing a basic rule of the scientific method.
We recognize that experienced field observers can provide important and reliable records, if supported by an adequate verifying description. Thus this request is an effort to perpetuate your record by obtaining concrete evidence which may be permanently preserved for examination by others in the future. This procedure is required for every extraordinary observation, irrespective of the observer.

Medium-sized sandpiper, about 9" long and long-legged & lang-necked. Smaller-bodied & longer-legged than a Killder; taller & brigger than a Baird's Sandpiper. Basically a plain tan bird. Face plain buff-colored with a large dark eye staring out from center of face. Indistinct, whitish eye-ring. Crown speckled & weakly streaked blackish. Round head with steep fore-head. Feathering of face extends for out on bill, further on the underside than on the appealside. Undersides pale buff, becoming off-white on lower belly. Faint barring on breast caused by feather rows. Dark spots on sides of breast in faint rows. Back overall darker — feathers dark brownish to black with distinct white edges forming rows of scallaps. Wing feathers dark brown distally, tan proximally with white & buff edges. Legs golden yellow, Bill black, med-long, strught with tapened and I'm flight places & underwing linings are white. Uppersides plain brownish in flight like Describe the bird's calls or sounds, if heard; including nethod of delivery the like. From perch, in flight, etc.:
