The bill and eye were dark. The facial pattern consisted of an olive green forehead, crown, nape, and back (red back stripes were not noted). The olive green of the crown flowed into the auricular region and became part of an eye stripe and a suborbital half circle. An eye stripe extended from the base of the bill through the eye into the auriculars, darker anterior and olive green behind the eye. A similar color semicircular sub orbital stripe existed, beginning half way between the bill and the eye. The chin, throat, belly were yellow. The flanks were yellow with black streaks, darker toward the chest and lighter toward the vent. The legs were dark. The wings and tail were a bit darker olive green with faint black streaks running the length of each feather.

Describe bird's call or song: none heard

Discuss similar species and how you eliminated them: Pine Warbler has different face pattern, white belly and undertail coverts. Palm Warbler has rufous crown, white belly (western race) and rufous flank streaking. Yellow Warbler has almost no facial pattern, little to no breast streaking, pale legs.

THE BIRD WAS A SMALL WARBLER, MOSTLY DARK OLIVE ABOVE AND YELLOW BELOW, IT HAD A YELLOW EYEBROW LINE, A DARK LINE THROUGH THE EYE, A YELLOW CHEEK PATCH BELOW THE EYE, AND A PARK MOUSTACHTAL LINE. THE YELLOW UNDERPARTS HAD BLACK STREAKS ON THE FLANKS, AND THE UNDERTAIL WAS WILLTISH. THE WINGS AND UPPER THIL WERE DARK, BUT NOT BLACK. THE BIRD HAD LARGE WHITE SPOTS ON THE UNDERTAIL, IT HAD TWO, VERY VERY PAINT WINGBARS, I DIDN'T SEE CHESTMUT STREAKS ON THE UPPER BACK.
