Describe the general and specific habitats in which the bird(s) occurred: Birds were at edge of forested area next to the Bonny Res. shoreline. They stayed fairly high in these trees. Based on my experience with this species in Ohio, this was not typical habitat.

Describe the bird's (birds') behaviors, particularly behaviors that were used in supporting the identification, e.g., flying, feeding, habits: Birds were singing and foraging in cottonwood trees near the shoreline of Bonny Res.

Undertail coverts were light yellow. Did not get a good look of back of birds. One bird seen very briefly seemed much more subdued in general coloring -- perhaps a female.

Describe the bird's (birds') call(s) and/or song(s), if noted: I found these birds by hearing them. I immediately recognized the song as an eastern warbler that I was familiar with, but I didn't think Prairie until I got a look at one. The song was an accelerating and rising ze ze ze that ended emphatically.


