## Description:

Paul Hurtado and I were leading a field trip for the CFO annual convention in Pueblo and had made a stop at the Fort Lyon Wildlife Easement to look for rare migrants. We had split up and Paul was lagging behind a bit when he yelled out "Scarlet Tanager" - this immediately drew our attention and we rushed back to where Paul was looking up at a brilliant red and black bird in the trees above him. The bird was of medium size for a passerine and was similarly shaped as the Western Tanager (Piranga ludoviciana), but the head and upper- & underparts were a bright red color. The wings and tail were solidly black which made a sharp contrast against the red of the body feathers. I did not note any other features

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration): none heard

What is your prior experience with this and similarly-appearing species? I have seen dozens of this species during spring migration in the east.

Light conditions: I don't recall

Optical equipment used: Zeiss 7x42 binoculars

**Distance, and how estimated:** the bird was mostly in the tree tops and was probably at closest within 20 meters for me
