Information on Trumpter Swans

Talked to Van Graham on the phone today and he passed along the following information from Ruth Shay (F&WS?) concerning the Trumpeter Swans near Radium.

Collar #43 was a yearling female which weighed 20 lbs. when captured last autumn. Collar #45 was an adult male. These were transplanted from the Red Rocks Refuge (in Idaho?) as part of a program to extend the range of Trumpeters. These birds were released 15 miles SW of Dubois. Wyoming in the headwaters of the Green River (Wind River Range?). The dry and cold winter in that part of the country may have contributed somewhat to the extensive movements of these birds and others.

Van mentioned that 5 more birds were shot illegally in Wyoming this fall and winter. Luckily most of the violators were apprehended.

Ruth Shay thought that the right wing on these birds should have been dyed yellow or purple. Did you notice this?

SWAN-DEATH CHARGES

— Two men have been charged in the killings of six trumpeter swans at Seedskadee National Wildlife Refuge.

Paul Bryant Jewkes, 28, and Douglas Todd Lewis, 24, are accused of shooting the swans Nov. 27. The birds were part of a transplant project designed to establish eight or 10 nesting pairs along the Green River.

Refuge managers say the killings appear to have caused the remaining swan population to flee the refuge.
