Duration of observation: off and on for a total of about 5-10 minutes each day

Description: I found the returning Pueblo Reservoir Great Black-backed Gull (GBBG) three times in January 1999. This bird has been present each winter at this site since at least the winter of 1993-1994. The bird was a very large gull, dwarfing the nearby Ring-billed Gulls (RBGU). The head was white, with faint, dark streaks; at any distance, the bird looked white-headed. The eyes were very small for the bird's size, making the eye color difficult to discern at any distance. At closest approach, I could see that they were pale, but usually they looked dark. The bill was yellow, very large (with a strong gonydeal angle), and had a red gonydeal spot. The mantle and upperwing were nearly black - the black wingtips only contrasted with the upperwing color slightly. The primaries were all tipped with white. The tenth primary had the distal 1/6 of the feather entirely white and there was a large, white mirror on P9. The rump, tail, and underparts were all white. The legs were pale pink. Only a couple primary tips extended beyond the tail tip.

Similar species eliminated: The only truly similar species have never been recorded in Colorado and both are very rare in the U.S. Slaty-backed Gull (SBGU) is smaller, has distinct head streaking, larger eyes, brighter pink legs, a different pattern on P10, and a smaller bill. Kelp Gull (KEGU) has vellow legs and a different wingtip pattern.

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration): No vocalizations heard.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly-appearing species? I have seen 1000s of GBBGs, one SBGU, and no KEGUs. I have also seen >50 Lesser Black-backed Gulls.

Light conditions: sun in various juxtapositions
