rumped size. Its bill was somewhat long, thick and slightly down-curved. Olive green on unstreaked back extended into nape, crown,				
and auriculars which contrasted with bright yellow throat. Olive green contrasted less with dull yellow eye ring and supercilium. Yellow on throat extended into upper belly which contrasted with white lower belly and under tail coverts. Blurry dark streaks				
speckled upper sides of breast but did not extend across the breast. The streaks became lighter gray and more diffuse as they extended				
down the flanks. Wings were dull olive gray with two prominent white wing bars on each wing. Primary tips were dark as were legs and feet. Tail was dark olive gray, but I did not see well the other details of tail.				
Describe the bird's (birds') call(s) and/or song(s), if noted: None heard.				
SIMILAR SPECIES – This is another critical part of your report.				
Prairie Warbler in non-breeding plumages looks similar to Pines but have yellowish under tail coverts and wing bars. Prairies often				
have diffuse reddish streaks on back in contrast with unstreaked back of Pine Warblers.  Female Blackpoil Warbiers also have streaked backs, have much duller yellow under parts than Pines, and often have flesh colored				
feet and legs. Blackpolls have noticeable white spots on primary tips which are lacking in Pine Warblers. Female Bay-breasted				
Warblers have streaked backs but lack streaking on under parts. They also lack the bright yellow under parts which many male Pine				
Warblers exhibit like the one I saw.				
Yellow-throated Vireos have brighter spectacles than Pines and lack the streaked under parts of Pine Warblers.
