Usually in the densest and lowest parts of a Russian Olive-juniper shelterbelt; moved through
shelterbelt quietly and in conspicuously. Occasionally, it perched in a rather open area of the
Russian Olives up to 15' off the ground; also seen for a few minutes in an adjacent weed
path, even there remaining in the densest part for most of the time; only once perching fully in the
Open. It was observed in a small flock of White-crowned Sparrows that also contained
2 Harris' and I white-throated.

Description (continued): Head and neck: face mostly uniform gray with little pattern except on the crown; a dork-gray stripe on side of crown going from bill to occiput; fore part of crown (area between the crown stripes) dull gold-yellow; middle and rear crown grayish-white.
Bill: typical Zonotrichia size and shaped-bill; grayish. Legs and feet: not recorded.
Upperparts: back brown with dusky streaking; wings brown with 2 white wingbars Underparts: throat, breast and belly mostly grayish, somewhat lighter on bally and buffy on the flanks.
Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery, (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration):
None heard
