Crown had dark brown heavy line on each side becoming blacker toward beak, Black extended over bridge of beak, Face was Solid light gray beige, except for dull Thin brown malar Stripe. Throat was slightly lighter man face & was light gray, Breast was solid light gray: { contained no streaks f no spots. Belly was slightly lighter. BIACK was light beige with dark streaks. Wings were dark brownish black slightly lighter toward upper wing coverts. Two whitish wing bars were on each wing. Tail was long brownish black; appeared rounded. Beak was dark brownish black especially upper mandible. Lower mandible was slightly lighter especially at base of lower mandible.

List similar species and how you eliminated them:

White crowned sparrow including immatures have light often pink beaks. Immature white crowns have rufous striped crown - not the blackish brown stripes of me bird I sow. Immature white crowns ; adults lack broad yellowish crown stripe of Golden-crowned Sparrow.
