Describe the bird's behavior (flying, feeding, habits, behaviors used in identifying the Species or in supporting the identification): The bird was observed with other phalaropes swimming and feeding on the water, approximately 10 feet to 20 yards off shore. The bird was catching insects both on the water and in the air. The bird was flushed by a Prairie Falcon and was not relocated. (did not try)

I first noticed the bird because of the lightness in color of this bird compared to the other swimming phalaropes. This bird also appeared slightly larger and bigger headed than the other Red-necked Phalaropes. The bird's nape, back and wings were an unstreaked, pale gray color. The crown was slightly darker gray than the nape. The fore crown, cheeks, throat, neck, breast and flanks were white. The eye was dark with a dark post ocular smudge or stripe. The bill was dark. The bill appeared much thicker and shorter than the surrounding Red-necked Phalaropes' bills. The belly, legs and vent area were not seen. Describe bird's call or song: none heard

Discuss similar species and how you eliminated them: I eliminated Red-necked Phalarope by the lack of streaking on the back and the bill structure. Wilson Phalarope was eliminated by the facial pattern and the bill structure.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species? I seen one before in Colorado and a few on a couple of pelagic trips.

List books, guides, recordings or other sources consulted and how this influenced your identification (during and after observation): I reviewed both Sibly and Hayman (Shorebirds) immediately after the observation.
